From **Father Iohn** 

Beloved in Christ:

I pray you and your loved ones enjoy the abundant grace of our Trinitarian God as we begin the New Ecclesiastical Year on September 1. On that date we will celebrate the Divine Liturgy and, for those who are present, we will hear these powerful and prophetic words of our

Lord Jesus Christ, as recorded by the Holy Evangelist Luke: "He opened the book (of the Prophet Isaiah)

and found the place where it was written, 'The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me, because He has anointed Me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent Me to proclaim release to captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord.' And He closed the book, and gave it back to the attendant, and sat down; and the eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on Him. And He began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." (Luke 4:17-21)



Please ponder this: If people, including St. Luke, were not present on that day in the synagogue to see and hear Christ proclaim that the prophecies are fulfilled in Him, there would not have been hearts and minds that would have been opened to following Him!

The same holds true in our time: If we are not present in the Church for our Divine Services especially in the Holy Liturgy – we deprive ourselves of seeing and hearing the Word of God, and moreover tasting the very Body and Blood of Christ for the remission of sins and Life eternal. For it is only in the active and in-person Life of the Church that we, who are humble of spirit, actually *hear* the good news, experience release from the captivity of sin and death in our Resurrected Lord, receive the recovery of sight from our spiritual blindness, and partake of the true *liberty* offered freely to us through the Holy and Life-giving Mysteries.

This New Ecclesiastical Year affords us the opportunity again to proclaim for ourselves, personally and as a community of faith, that we are intent on making it "The Year of the Lord" - and without any excuses! The Lord's Banquet is open to all who desire to partake (and I am not simply talking about the Greek Food Festival or the return of Fellowship Hour, as good as these are): We must be committed to making the Lord's Day truly His Day, and stop making excuses as to why we are not showing up – because these excuses will not fare well for us when we meet Him face to face at the time of our departure from this fleeting life. Further, when we make excuses why we are not receiving Holy Communion, we are sadly depriving ourselves of the physical, emotional and spiritual benefits from partaking of "the Bread of Life" (John 6:35) and "the Medicine of Immortality." (St. Ignatios of Antioch)

### Parish Council Report

The Greek Food Festival will definitely be a go this year. The dates are *Friday*, September 10 through Sunday, September 12. We will be open on Friday and Saturday from 3:00 pm to 11:00 pm and on Sunday from noon to 10:00 pm.

Although there are some who may have reservations about us having the Festival given the present status of the pandemic, we are going forward with Faith and Confidence, and truly

believe we will have a tremendous event. We are in high gear, ready to offer our guests the total "Greek Experience" filled with high quality food, high quality music, efficient and courteous service, and a very "high energy" and "Festive" atmosphere replete with our Greek Culture that resonates with all ages and all kinds of guests.

Putting on the Festival is a monumental undertaking that requires us all to give of our time, talents and treasures – most especially, our time and talents. Many of us have already been working hard to make the Festival a momentous success; however, we are now at the point where we need everyone to pitch in and help. Although much of the planning was completed many months ago, due to the events of the last 18 or so months and the ensuing uncertainty, we are left to having to operate within a limited time frame to go from planning to execution. Where we would normally have four to five months, we have been relegated down to just two. Planning wise, we are in a pretty good place; getting people to help, we are somewhat behind; however, it is picking up and we truly believe our Parish and friends will come through.



How to help? First and foremost, please sign up to help in any area of the Festival where you feel you can best contribute. We will have sign-up stations after Liturgy on Sundays, or you can call the Church Office at any time during the week. We want to make the Festival an effort of love and make it fun for our Church Members and friends to be a part of. Working the Festival should be a great time for us to work together and get to know one another better. It should be a positive experience for all involved. The more people that sign up and pitch in to help, the better it is for everyone involved. If enough people volunteer, no one should have to work more than one or two shifts, except for people in key leadership positions. This will leave plenty of time for everyone to also attend the Festival as participants and not just as workers.

Other ways to help? We need help with Pre-Sales. Pre-Sales are comprised of Raffle Tickets, Coupon Books, Souvenir Magazine Ads, and Vendor Leasing. They provide the "seed" money for the Festival. We have many necessary expenditures prior to the Festival. The Church accounts are usually low during summer months and it puts a tremendous stress on our Parish finances to fund the Festival. Also, on the first day of the Festival we need to have \$40,000 to \$50,000 on hand to fund the "bank," which allows us to fill the cash drawers at each booth. More importantly, good strong pre-sales could conceivably fund up to 40% or more of the nut going into the Festival. In addition, the greater the pre-sales, the lower the risk for us in the event of inclement weather or other intangibles. We need to strive to have \$200,000 in pre-sales. By obtaining this goal, we can cover almost 40% of the nut; and moreover, we could conceivably have all our expenses covered by the end of Friday night and be into profit going into Saturday.

The Raffle is comprised of 1,000 tickets being sold for \$100 per ticket: First prize is a chance to win \$25,000 in cash. The raffle also includes five \$1,000 cash prizes, three big screen TVs, and host of other prizes with a value greater of \$100. Your chances are around 1 in 25 chance of winning something. Also, 10% of the proceeds of the raffle will go directly to help a few charities in the Las Vegas area: This year it will be Suicide Prevention and for the Johnny Crisstopher Foundation. The Coupon Books are a \$32 value selling for \$25: They include four \$6 dollar coupons for food and an \$8 dollar admission ticket. For the Souvenir Magazine, we sell ads in various sizes. Please help us in this effort by buying and or selling the various items. Each of them is a great value and really helps the Church.

We will again be hosting a 26.2 mile Torch Run: Proceeds will go toward the treatment and cure for Autism. The Torch Run begins with a short prayer at 2:00 pm on the Friday of the Festival at Tivoli Village, and culminates at 7:00 pm with the lighting of the Festival Torch on the Festival Grounds.

We need runners and sponsors for the run. Each runner gets to run one mile with the Torch. We can schedule each runner one mile at a time and place along the route which is convenient. After you run your leg, we can transport you back to your car. We also urge groups to run together. On several legs of the route, we have groups of around 10 kids running together. This is a fun event that brings a lot of attention to the Festival and our chosen charity. Please call the Church Office if you are interested in running a one mile leg and/or sponsoring a mile. Runners will receive a T-Shirt and Coupon Book.

This year we have made some significant changes to the entertainment with a band comprised of musicians gathered from all over the Country and from Greece. These musicians are some of the best and we are excited to have them perform. We will also have some surprise entertainment events that should contribute greatly to the energy of the Festival.

In closing, if we all pitch in together, we will have a great event. We will be the first of our kind of event to take place in a long time. People in Las Vegas are chomping at the bit to participate in an outdoor event, and we fully expect to have a large crowd. Please pray for good weather, and a great Festival. May God Bless Us!

### Stewardship and Community Outreach

September starts a New Ecclesiastical Year and like all new years it provides an opportunity to pause and reflect on the year gone by as well as ponder the potential of the year to come. Ecclesiastical and calendar years are similar in this regard. Both may also be viewed from a life-cycle perspective: The former begins with the *Nativity of the Theotokos (September 8)* and ends with her *Dormition (August 15)*, while the latter is often depicted as a baby coming in on New Year's Day and an old man departing on New Year's Eve. Both New Years provide an ideal opportunity for personal reflection, for renewed commitment, and for a fresh start.

Focusing on Mary at the beginning and end of each Church Year is quite fitting, for if ever there was a positive role model for having a good relationship with Jesus, it would be the Theotokos. Contrasting the excellent example set by the Theotokos versus the reality of our own recently completed individual Church Year will always indicate there is room for improvement on our part. Let us not be discouraged, though, but rather end our introspection by making a fresh start with renewed zeal to work perhaps a little harder at our Christian living this new year by saying "Yes" to God: "Yes," we will engage a little more fully in our community; "Yes," we will commit to support the beautiful campus and wonderful ministries of our Church; "Yes," we will offer our time, our talents and our treasures not just during this month's Greek Food Festival, but throughout the year.

By saying "Yes" to God in these ways, it could be viewed that we will individually and collectively be spreading a protective veil of Stewardship across our beloved St. John the Baptist Greek Orthodox Church – keeping it strong in community, keeping it healthy in facility and finances, and keeping it at peace through God's grace.



# CONNECTING WITH . . . CHRIST OUR CHURCH AND ONE ANOTHER

### From Father Seraphim

At the end of each and every liturgical service served by a priest or bishop in the Orthodox Church there occurs a sequence of prayers called "The Dismissal." The dismissal is ultimately a petition for mercy and salvation to Christ invoking the prayers and blessing of a list of intercessors for us. First and foremost in the list before any of the Saints or Angels, we invoke our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, then directly His Holy Mother, who is the greatest of all the Saints in Heaven and higher even than the Angels; then immediately third in this list is the subject of my reflection: "The Power of the Precious and Life-Giving Cross." The three descriptive adjectives pronounced in blessing and intercession over every Orthodox Christian concerning the Cross are worthy of investigation separately.

First, we speak of the Cross of Christ as an instrument of power (Greek: δύναμις). What power does the Holy Cross possess? St. Paul gives us a helpful beginning in our understanding in his first letter to the Corinthians, "For the word of the Cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God and the wisdom of God. Because the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men." (1 Corinthians 1:18, 24-25) Truly Jesus seemed scandalously weak hanging there dying upon the Cross to many in the ancient world. This for Christians however was not weakness, but was the greatest show of force – the all-victorious humble force of forgiveness and love which overcomes the full strength of hate, injustice and murderous death. Christ's command for all who desire to follow Him is to "take up your own cross daily and follow after Me" (Luke 9:23) – and this is among the paradoxical Christian truths. When we willingly die for each other in a life of self-sacrificial love – even for our enemies – out of love for God, we truly "find our life for everlasting life." (Matthew 16:25) We Christians possess the unique power as our Crucified Lord: The very power to overcome evil and death through bearing willingly the Cross of forgiveness and love, thus acquiring our own experience of the power of our Lord's Resurrection.

The second term used in description of the Holy Cross is *precious* (*Greek τίμιος*). *Τίμιος* in Greek means "honored" or "expensive" like "precious stones," which are rare and difficult to acquire. The Cross for us is precious not because it is a cross in general – but rather all crosses subsequently receive their sanctity, this unique *preciousness*, from the very Cross upon which the Body of our Lord Jesus Christ was transfixed with



nails. The Blood which flowed from the hands, feet, and side of the Incarnate Lord forever sanctified that Wood: It became the symbol inextricably linked to the Person of Jesus and subsequently all of His followers who identify themselves as Christians. St. Gregory the Theologian said of this Blood shed on the Cross, that a single drop of it was precious and powerful enough to recreate the entire universe. (*Oration 45 – On Pascha*). It is no surprise then that this Holy Wood, on which the Son of God was willingly sacrificed, has been venerated by Christians in every age and place. Some very large pieces of it are preserved in monasteries and Churches throughout the world, especially at Xeropotomou on Mt. Athos. It is always cherished, even a single sliver of the precious Wood in reliquaries. These relics of the Cross are distributed as precious treasures which are infinitely beyond any monetary value and remain in this world the ever-present signs of God's love for us.

The final epithet we hear in the dismissal is life-giving (literally life-making/creating; Greek: ζωοποιός). Why should we declare that an instrument of torturous death is indeed "life-creating?" In the Paschal Hymn repeated every single Sunday morning by the Priest before the Great Entrance ("Having beheld the Resurrection of Christ . . ."), we hear a phrase of paramount importance: "Through the Cross Joy has come into all the world." Ultimately the Cross cannot be understood outside of the certainty of the Resurrection. The Cross and Resurrection are two aspects of a single reality: In the words of St. Paul, it was there on the Cross that "Christ having wiped out the handwriting of requirements that was against us, which was contrary to us, He destroyed it, having nailed it to the Cross. He disarmed principalities and powers, and made a public spectacle of them, triumphing over them in the Cross." (Colossians 2:15) The Cross of Christ is vital for us because it is the defeat of sin as well as the defeat of the opposing demonic powers! No longer can the demons bring the writing or list of all our sins and take us down to Hades when we die. Moreover, through Holy Confession we participate in the act of Christ tearing up that handwriting of our sins and nailing it to His Cross on which we are cleansed by His Blood and those accusing demons are literally disarmed and defeated. This is the eternal Life given to us through the Cross.

The Cross is not only symbolically life-giving, but actually has been for centuries: One of the very first accounts comes to us from the life of St. Helen who uncovered from the earth the True Cross in Jerusalem. A deceased woman was placed upon the wood of the Cross and she immediately arose from the dead! We all need to conscientiously wear our Cross and never take it off for any reason, for we received it at our Baptism as a tangible reminder that we are claimed for Christ forever. If for some reason you do not want to lose an expensive or meaningful Cross, we have plenty of affordable options in our Bookstore. We must all strive to make the sign of the Cross more often and with a greater reverence over ourselves and our children, when we get into our cars, over the food and drink we consume to the glory of God, and most especially at any time of human or demonic attack. To not use one of the most important and greatest weapons we have in the spiritual life against the devil is to enter the arena of salvation without the proper armor.

This *September 14*, may we all gather in our Holy Church to bow down in reverence before the Throne of the King of Glory, the precious and life-giving Cross of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.



### Orthodox Bookstore

Greetings from the Bookstore!

This September marks again a new beginning of the Ecclesial Year in our Church. After a tumultuous year of an ongoing pandemic, polarizing politics, and seemingly general unease in our world, it is possible that some of us have felt unsettled – even regarding Church itself and have been "checking our footing," so to speak, to ensure solid footing on the "correct" and unshakable Rock of Christ. It is natural to look to the origins of things in such cases in order to anchor oneself once again in mind and spirit amidst what we could call the philosophical or ideological quicksand constantly assaulting us from all directions.



Fortunately, in this month's featured selection, *The Religion of the Apostles: Orthodox Christianity in the First Century*, Rev. Dr. Stephen De Young takes us back in time to the earliest congregations founded and ministered to by the Holy Apostle themselves, born out of their first century Jewish worldview, and makes the case regarding the beginnings of our Faith Tradition and spiritual disciplines. Many today suppose, for example, that Orthodox Christianity and its liturgical rites and way of life evolved over time away from Apostolic teaching and practice. By contrast, De Young states and makes clear throughout the book that we did not "materialize from the Fathers of the Church after a disjunction from the living history in which the Scriptures were embedded." Further, it was "not an innovation derived from the Church councils that came later. Rather, those councils explained, confirmed, and proclaimed that Faith, which had already existed for centuries preceding them."

From The Religion of the Apostles:

"... St. Paul understood the religion he practiced (and the gospel he proclaimed) after his encounter with Christ as a continuation of that which he had practiced his entire life. He did not perceive himself to have disembarked from that earlier religion and entered another. Rather, he understood his experience on the road to Damascus in terms of the religion that included the Hebrew Scriptures that had not yet been canonized into the "Bible" as we would recognize it today. He saw the Gentiles he baptized after becoming a servant of Christ to be entering the religion of his youth; worshipping Yahweh, the God of Israel; and becoming the children of Abraham. It is therefore completely appropriate to speak of 'Old Testament Christianity,' the religion that existed under the Old Covenant, as well as the Christianity of the New Covenant. These are, in fact, the same religion. This religion, the religion practiced by the Apostles and their successors, is the subject of this book."
