Beloved in Christ:

Christ is Risen!

During the month of May, as the temperature rises in Las Vegas, we are encouraged to be water smart, conserving this most precious natural resource when we can. Living in the desert we are regularly reminded of the shortage of water. In the Biblical lands water supply and drought are also constant themes.

On the fourth Sunday after Pascha (May 14 this year), our Lord Jesus Christ directs our attention to where the wells run deep. He has a profound and revelatory encounter, in the Gospel of St. John, with a Samaritan Woman at Jacob’s Well: Our Lord, wearied and hot from a long journey, enters a long and life-changing dialogue with this woman who has come to draw water, requesting her to *“Give Me a drink.” (John 4:7)* The woman is amazed that Jesus speaks to her, for the Jews had no dealings with Samaritans – and He replies to her questioning, *“If you knew the gift of God, and Who it is that is saying to you, ‘Give Me a drink,’ you would have asked Him, and He would have given you living water.” (4:10)* Christ then teaches this woman that He is not speaking of the water that is drawn from this or any earthly well, but rather that those who partake of *“the water that I shall give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life.” (4:14)*

As we have chanted in the Paschal Canon, Jesus Christ is the Fountain of Life: *“Come, let us partake of a new drink: not one miraculously brought forth from a barren rock, but a spring of immortality, welling up from Christ’s tomb, from which we draw strength.” (3rd Ode)* The Lord, speaking through the Prophet Jeremiah, admonished Ancient Israel for rebelliously committing these two evils: *“They have forsaken Me, the fountain of living waters, and hewed out cisterns for themselves, broken cisterns, that can hold no water.” (Jeremiah 2:13)* Yet our loving and merciful Lord, through His Crucifixion has forgiven all of us sinners who have forsaken Him, and by His glorious Resurrection has restored and reconciled us to Him, so that we can become “new cisterns” – that is, a new creation – partaking of eternal life.

Most assuredly, Christ foretells of the Baptism into Him which would begin on Pentecost Sunday, fifty days after His Resurrection – for His reference about the living water also reveals the activity of the Holy Spirit in the life of the faithful. Speaking to the Samaritan Woman about the life in the Church that would embark with the descent of the Holy Spirit on the Apostles, He says, *“The hour is coming, and now is, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in Spirit and truth.” (John 4:23)* As we are Baptized into the Orthodox Church, we enter into Communion with the Living God, we are taught and we uphold the True Faith, and through worship and the Holy Mysteries we partake of His Kingdom, glorifying the Holy Trinity.

Upon hearing and understanding our Lord’s words, this woman repented of her sins and, following His Resurrection, became equal to the Apostles in her witness of Christ. This woman – known as St. Photini – was eventually martyred in Rome, where the pagan emperor Nero had her thrown into a well. Still today, Christ is reaching out to all of us, even in our sinfulness, and calling us to become renewed in Him and witnesses of His Truth, especially in the face of false teachings and godlessness. May we, by His grace, become worthy cisterns of the living water!

Parish Council Report

There are many, many people to thank who stepped up with their time and talents to ensure a phenomenal experience for everyone: Our clergy, whose guidance and energy throughout the many services was inspiring; Parish Council members and other volunteers, led by Demetri Asim, who all worked together to keep things running smoothly and efficiently for parishioners before, during and after services; our Philoptochos for their many contributions, including the flowers for the Epitaphion and the pastries for the Agape Picnic; Ernestine Kachikis for assisting and coordinating the floral decorations; Andrea Takas for spearheading the egg dyeing effort; Eileen Koutsulis for organizing the Myrrh Bearers; Adam Bieker for his leadership in organizing and coordinating a very successful and tremendous Agape Picnic; Steve Likourinou and his employees for their amazing contributions of time, expertise and equipment to provide an outside overflow area for worshipers that included an incredible high-tech audio-visual experience for people attending the Holy Friday and Resurrection services, and for providing the music for the Agape Picnic; Full Circle Events for donating a large tent for the outside overflow area; and Sam Koutsulis, Steve Tzelalis and their work crews for cooking and preparing the food for Palm Sunday and the Agape Picnic. Lastly, thank you to all the many people who helped in making everything great.

As we move forward from Pascha, it is imperative that we work together on Stewardship. There is so much more we need to do to get Stewardship on track. In talking about Stewardship, it is often thought as merely covering the expenses of the Church and to a certain extent that is true. However, we need to understand that Stewardship is so much more. It is about giving back for the many blessings bestowed upon us and becoming active participants in the Church. It is about having a vision both in the present and in the future. Stewardship is the life blood of our Church. One of its primary purposes is to promote spiritual growth and strengthen our Faith. It not only provides for our place of Worship, our Clergy and our Ministries, but it also provides for the future of our Church by bringing and keeping our youth in the Faith. The importance of Stewardship cannot be overstated. So we ask each and every one of you to work toward building Stewardship and contributing to the Church's vision.

On another note, as stated in this column last month, Father Matthew and his family will be leaving us next month to become the priest of another parish, St. John the Baptist Greek Orthodox Church in Beaverton, Oregon. We are going to miss him and Presvytera Annie tremendously. Please join us on ***Sunday, June 4 for a Farewell Luncheon.*** Father Matthew's replacement is a soon-to-be-graduate of Holy Cross Greek Orthodox Seminary, named Seraphim Ramos. As previously stated, he is married and has a baby daughter, and has been described as being energetic and pious, yet down to earth. Seraphim is due to visit our Church May 12-16; we look forward to meeting and welcoming him into our parish. His Ordination, which will take place here in our Church, is presently in the works and should be formally announced soon.

Pertaining to the Iconography, there has been some limited movement. We are told that the long awaited on-site inspection by the Immigration Office out of Southern California is not too far off and should occur in the next 30 to 45 days. Once this takes place, we are told it should only take about a month to get the appropriate papers for the iconographers to come here and complete the Iconography. Realistically, we are looking at somewhere around the end of July or early August. We will try to keep everyone informed with the latest information as it becomes available to us.

To keep you further informed, projects we are presently working on include completing the massive landscaping project undertaken last summer, completing the painting of the outdoor bathrooms, and painting the barbeque and outdoor oven areas. We will also be reworking the floors in Panos Hall and Kokkos Hall: There seems to have been a problem with the epoxy so the floors need to be re-sanded and a new coat of epoxy applied. We are also hoping to start fixing the parking lots soon. We would like to thank Ramona Tasios and Constantine Petriuc for their efforts in getting these projects done. Please take the time to look around the Church grounds and see the many improvements. We are also working on getting C&E organized and profitable: Many thanks to Jim Monoyudis and Mara Braun for getting this done.

Stewardship and Community Outreach

Χριστὸς Ανέστη!

With Pascha, Western Easter, and Spring Break all coinciding this year many people were traveling in mid-April. All that travel got me thinking about the marketing of loyalty programs and how they try to persuade consumers into limiting their purchasing choice to a particular airline, rental car company, or hotel chain. Exclusive awards, deep discounts, short lines, special lounges, color-coded status cards or other preferential treatment often await those with high frequent-flier mileage or point balances. These programs are not just limited to travel; you can also find them at gas stations, grocery stores, retail stores, and yes, even casinos.

All of this is done to encourage a deeper affinity and a stronger bond with a particular company. However, should you reduce your purchases or spread them around to several different companies, penalties are exacted: status may never reach a “preferred” level, points may expire, awards may drift further out of reach – with the result being that you find yourself excluded from the lounge, in the long line, at the crummy table, or in the small room with no view. There is freedom of choice, but there is also reward and punishment based upon how the company judges your loyalty.

So what do these successful marketing programs have to do with Stewardship? These programs are quite popular. These programs are very effective. These programs are familiar to nearly all of us in one form or another. On the other hand, our Stewardship program is not very popular and often not very effective.

However our Church (through Scripture, Tradition, the writings of the Church Fathers and the lives of the Saints) does, in a way, have something like a loyalty program: guidelines laying out the benefits of the program; description of benefits to be gained or lost; and mention of special perks. The guidance is all there, the invitation remains open, our names are already on file, a response is requested and awaited. What remains is for us to choose wisely.

Businesses have some customers who choose to remain faithful, some customers who choose to turn away, and some customers who choose to return. Changes in the relationship are dependent on how they individually exercise their freedom of choice, occasionally self-evaluating their behavior with respect to the loyalty program. Likewise, in Church God has those who choose to remain faithful, those who choose to turn away (sin), and those who choose to return (repent). Changes in the relationship are dependent on how they individually exercise their freedom of choice, occasionally self-evaluating their behavior with respect to their Lord and Savior.

This Paschal season we celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus Christ and the astounding offer made available to all. Jesus takes the judgment we deserve for our sins, and allows Himself to be sacrificed on the Cross. His Death gives us hope of God’s forgiveness. God accepts Jesus’ sacrifice. He is resurrected and breaks the bonds of sin, death and hell. His Resurrection gives us hope of eternal life. However, should we choose not to participate in this special offer but rather to “take our business elsewhere,” our souls would not be delivered from sin, death and eternal separation from God.

In this ultimate of loyalty programs, our attention is drawn to the certainty of judgment (punishment or reward) with the words spoken in every Divine Liturgy service: “With the fear of God, with faith and love, draw near.” In this loyalty program, we are each allotted one lifelong “special promotional period” in which to “act now.” Now is the time to draw near with faith and love. Draw near to our Church community. Draw near to practicing all facets of good Stewardship. Draw near to living according to the tenets of the Orthodox Faith. Perhaps spending just a few more hours helping at Church might move us closer to the sheep and further from the goats come Judgment Day (*Matthew 25:31-46*). Perhaps spending just a few more dollars supporting of our Church and its mission might move us further from the rich man suffering in torment on the wrong side of the great chasm (*Luke 16:19-31*). Perhaps spending just a few more moments praying each day, spending just a few more days attending worship services each month, and spending just a few more months living with a Lenten attitude each year might multiply our “pilgrimage mileage points” as we trek along the Way (*John 14:6*).

Dear Beloved Brothers and Sisters,

Christ is Risen!!! It has been a beautiful and blessed time for me and my family here at St. John the Baptist Church. Nearly four years ago we arrived on a hot July evening and spent our first night in Vegas at the Excalibur! We settled into our home, then I showed up as a deacon to serve on the last two Sundays in July 2013. From those first encounters, we experienced the warm embrace of the people in this community.

It has been some eventful years! First was the annual Greek Food Festival. What an extravaganza! I remember walking around the Church grounds, conversing with all of you in your appointed stations, then going to the stage to watch our kids dance – including my own son this past year! Then there was all of the excitement and commotion of having thousands

of people stream through our gates, many of whom took a few minutes to attend a Church Tour. (I met some of you, our recent converts, for the first time at those Church Tours.)

"The ancient philosophers believed that the soul is at a specific place in the body, that the body is the prison of the soul and that the salvation of the soul is its release from the body. The Fathers teach that the soul is everywhere in the body. St. Gregory Palamas says that . . . the soul, as it sustains the body together with which it was created 'is everywhere in the body, not as in a place, nor as if it were encompassed, but as sustaining, encompassing and giving life to it because it possesses this too in the image of God.'"


