Beloved in Christ:

The weather was unusually hot and there was a lot of competing activity in our city, yet we were blessed with a crowd of loyal supporters who made it a priority to partake of our many Greek culinary offerings and join in the spirit of “Opa!” as they have for the past 46 years – and for this, we thank God! Under the inimitable leadership of Gus Flangas and with the commendable commitment of our staff, captains and volunteers – as well as the invaluable hands on labor of the Red Rock Search and Rescue team – this year’s Greek Festival was an impressive event for all who attended: Thank God for all of you who cared enough to sacrifice so many hours for the good of our Parish!

Thousands came for our Church Tours, admiring the beauty of our place of worship (even with the scaffolding) and very much engaged in our presentation; while most people come for our delicious food, many souls we also drawn to and appreciated the spiritual food we also provided – so many of our attendees thanked us for offering this event and sharing our beautiful Church and Faith. Nearly 20,000 visitors passed by our magnificent Church as they entered the Festival grounds, and most assuredly many were moved by the beautiful mosaic icons that adorn the exterior of our holy place of worship.

One of our exterior icons – which I encourage all of us to observe more closely as we enter the Church this month – is that of St. Gerasimos, the patron of the Island of Cephalonia whom we commemorate on **October 20**. In the hands of this great saint there is a scroll which reads, “*Children, find peace within yourselves and do not seek lofty places.*” This wonderful teaching, which paraphrases a passage in *Ecclesiastes (10:6)*, reminds us that we must continuously seek the spiritual peace that only Jesus Christ gives and imitate His genuine humility.

St. Gerasimos was born in the early 16th century in Trikala, Peloponnesos and from a young age was drawn to the life of an ascetic: When he reached the age of maturity, he went to Mount Athos to become a monk and upon leaving the holy mountain he made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, where he eventually served as a lamp-lighter at the Church of the Holy Sepulcher. The Patriarch Germanos ordained Gerasimos to the diaconate and then to the priesthood, but even as a priest he continued to live as an ascetic, spending five years in solitude. Eventually the holy Gerasimos made his way to the lush Island of Cephalonia, where he lived in a cave that he dug in the earth, overlooking the sea, around which he personally planted many plane trees (which still exist) – until the Lord called him to establish and build a convent at Omala.

After 30 years in Cephalonia, St. Gerasimos fell asleep in the Lord on August 15, 1579, at the age of 71 – and when his grave was opened two years later, as is the custom in Greece, his body was found fragrant and incorrupt with a healing power. When canonized, the celebration of St. Gerasimos’ falling asleep was moved to August 16 so as to not conflict with the Feast of the Dormition of the Theotokos; the disinterment of his sacred body is commemorated on October 20.



Each year on Cephalonia, there is the miraculous appearance of non-poisonous snakes with crosses on their foreheads that suddenly appear out of nowhere during the Fast of the Theotokos and disappear again on the Feast of her Dormition: The islanders date this appearance from the time of the Ottoman invasion (according to the Cephalonians, the nuns were initially transformed into snakes to ward off the invaders) and consider it a great blessing to hold these sacred creatures.

St. Gerasimos is associated with healing those suffering from physical ailments, as well as those who are demon-possessed or struggling with mental illnesses. It is an awesome blessing to have St. Gerasimos prominently placed in front of our Church, especially with all the ailments – physical, mental and spiritual – that afflict us so regularly, particularly right here in the spiritual wilderness of Las Vegas!

Through the prayers of St. Gerasimos may we, the beloved children of God, struggle faithfully toward our permanent home in the Kingdom of Heaven.



Stewardship and Community Outreach

Due to unforeseen circumstances I find myself with something of an enforced slow-down during this month (written in September), which is one of the Church's busiest – what with Greek Food Festival preparations, the Festival itself, scrambling to cover expenses for the last (hopefully) of the slow Summer months, a new inquirers class beginning, additional mid-week services for feast days – you get the idea.

With time on my hands, and a natural inclination toward thanking (and thinking about) God regarding His abundant mercy, I have found myself reading through the *Orthodox Study Bible* and thought I would share a few text selections for this month's Stewardship reflection.



From *1 Timothy, Chapter 6, Verses 17-19*, we find St. Paul exhorting Timothy to: *“Command those who are rich in this present age not to be haughty, nor to trust in uncertain riches but in the living God, Who gives us richly all things to enjoy. Let them do good, that they be rich in good works, ready to give, willing to share, storing up for themselves a good foundation for the time to come, that they may lay hold on eternal life.”*

From the OSB Glossary come a few terms with which to refresh our memories:

Discipleship – The life of learning, growing, self-sacrifice, and commitment required of every Christian. A Christian not only believes in Christ but leaves everything to follow Him.

Mercy – The compassionate, steadfast love of God for sinners. Christians reflect the mercy of God by caring for others. The most frequent prayer in Orthodox worship is “Lord, have mercy.”

Steward(ship) – A Steward is one who manages property belonging to another. All that a Christian has belongs to God. Thus, the Christian gives back to God out of the material blessings he has received from Him for the work of the Church. In the Old Testament, God commanded the faithful to give a tithe or ten percent of their goods to God; though not under law, St. John Chrysostom teaches Christians should give that much and more. Christians are also Stewards of the spiritual knowledge which God has entrusted to us. We must preserve and advance the heritage of Apostolic doctrine intact for future generations.

Now that the hustle and bustle of the Festival is over, let us put aside the knowledge of how well it went and how much money it generated. Let us instead pause and contemplate our discipleship, our caring for others, and our Stewardship that we may discern whether we are doing all we can do to grow in our faith, to engage with the Church community, and to strengthen our Stewardship. Further, regarding that strong Stewardship, perhaps we will discern that we can actually boost our giving a little bit each year, aiming toward a true tithe, thus leaving the Church in a strong position to serve our children for many generations.

On a personal note, I would like to close with a heartfelt thank you to all at St John the Baptist Church who have lifted us up in prayer, sent well wishes, and offered support. It has been a rich blessing of humbling magnitude.

Parish Council Report

We just completed another successful and tremendous Greek Food Festival. Although not as financially successful as last year, it is still one of our best in financial terms. Unfortunately, because we had to deal with daytime temperatures in excess of 100 degrees, and competition from many other large events held that weekend, our all overall attendance numbers were down, especially during the daytime. However, the Festival was amazing and one of our best yet. The music and stage production was absolutely incredible, the food we served was great as usual, our Church Tours were well attended, and our parishioners and friends who worked at the Festival had great enthusiasm. This year we had the help of the Red Rock Search and Rescue. They did all the set up, provided most of the labor for the event, and helped with the clean-up after it was over. They were absolutely outstanding, true professions and we sincerely hope they come back again next year – we cannot thank them enough. All of this coupled with the surroundings of our beautiful grounds and our positively charged and high-energy atmosphere made for an amazing “Greek Experience.” We thank God again for a truly blessed event.

Our annual 26.2 mile Torch Run was truly successful and an event in of itself. This year we supported the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society of Southern Nevada, in memory of 12 year-old Michael Manteris, who was diagnosed with a rare form of Leukemia known as AML. The run was kicked off with a prayer by Father Seraphim at Tivoli Village, who was also the first runner. Several news anchors from Channel Three and Channel Five participated in the run and carried the torch on several of the miles. We also had several of our parishioners and parish friends carry the torch. On two of the miles of the run, the torch was carried by two pediatric patients along with their families; it was amazing seeing these kids participate. Many moments of the run were streamed live at the Festival on the large video screen on the stage. The entry of the torch on to the Church Grounds was truly amazing and highly emotional. Led by the John Koutsulis’ Search and Rescue truck, the torch was carried in by the family of Michael Manteris, accompanied by about 30 other runners, two Metropolitan police officer cruisers, the command and control limousine, a mobile electronic billboard truck advertising the Festival and Leukemia and Lymphoma Society of Southern Nevada, and another limousine that picked up our runners. In addition, four other motorcycle police officers joined in on the last two miles after seeing the procession and helped escort the torch to the Church Grounds. For his tremendous contributions to our Church, Peter Papas was chosen to light the Torch jointly with Art Manteris in memory of his grandson, Michael. It was a phenomenal start to our Festival. In addition to the Torch Run, we earmarked ten percent of the raffle proceeds to donate to FEAT (Families for Effective Autism Treatment).

As I have said many times in the past, it takes a tremendous amount of hard work by many to put on the Festival and to make it work. We want to thank everyone who gave so much of their time and talents this year to make the Festival a resounding success. There are so many people to thank for the Festival’s success and, at the risk leaving somebody out, we think there are many people who deserve special recognition for their efforts and we sincerely apologize if we left anyone out. Again, we are extremely grateful for her efforts. Penny worked countless hours for almost two weeks, keeping track of inventory and making sure we had everything we needed to operate, and we are truly grateful for her efforts.



It is time to build on the momentum of the Festival and turn our attention toward Stewardship. We cannot over emphasize the importance of Stewardship and we ask that everyone step up and contribute. It is so important to the future of our Church. Please pray and look into your hearts about Stewardship and look at it as a way of “giving back..”

Pertaining to the Iconography, we are still working on obtaining certification as a 501(c)(3) organization. We have nothing new to report other than it is still in the hands of the IRS. We are working diligently on it and praying. It is extremely frustrating to say the least. We will keep everyone informed of any developments. We have a *Parish Assembly* scheduled for *Sunday, November 4*, right after Liturgy in Panos Hall. We encourage you all to attend and learn about the operations of our Church. At this Assembly we will be giving reports on our finances and the Festival, receiving nominations for the Parish Council, voting on a Budget for the 2019 year, and discussing our annual Archdiocese Total Commitment as well as several other important items. Please mark your calendars and attend.

In closing and as usual, we want to again thank the various Church ministries and organizations, and the many individuals for all the work they do and have done to help us secure the future of the Church for ourselves and most importantly, our children. It clearly takes a lot of work from the entire community to maintain our Church. Please step forward whenever you can and pitch in. We know much is always happening, but every event is extremely important. Please get involved as we move forward to make our Church better.



From Father Seraphim

“Let us honor the man who by lances inherited the grace from the Savior’s side that was pierced by the lance, and from which the Savior pours out for us streams of life and incorruption; Demetrios, who was most wise in his teachings, and with the Martyrs wears a wreath of victory. He finished the course of his contest through blood, and through miracles he became illustrious throughout the world. He was zealous for the Master, and a compassionate lover of the poor; many a time the defender of the people of Thessalonika in many a dread danger...” (Doxastikon of the Feast of St. Demetrios)



Every year on **October 26**, the Holy Church commemorates the Great-Martyr and Wonder-Worker Demetrios, the Myrrh-Flowing. St. Demetrios was born circa 270 in the city of Thessaloniki and was the son of the Roman proconsul assigned with the defense of the city from barbarian invasion. The young nobleman was trained as a warrior himself, and raised as a Christian secretly by his pious parents due to persecution. Upon coming of age, the future saint was elevated to the rank of Duke of Thessaly by the pagan emperor of the East, Maximian (ruled 286-305), but soon returned to Thessaloniki to serve as proconsul following his father’s death. Immediately after assuming his new role he openly preached Jesus Christ, debating with the pagans of his city in the forum and winning many converts.

When the Emperor Maximian returned from a victorious campaign against the Sarmatians in 304, he stopped in Thessaloniki to hold pagan games and sacrifices celebrating his triumph. The Christian proconsul was denounced by pagans who were envious of his success, and when called before the Emperor St. Demetrios boldly confessed Christ. He was immediately imprisoned in a subterranean bath house where waste and excrement were disposed of to await sentencing. While confined, Demetrios was visited by a young Christian named Nestor whom he had personally catechized. Nestor asked for a blessing to engage in single combat with the giant Lyaeus, who was posing as the champion of paganism in the arena. St. Demetrios gave his blessing, signed him with the cross, and Nestor, against all odds, slew his opponent in the arena shouting “God of Demetrios, help me!” – just as David had once defeated Goliath.

Maximian, enraged and learning that this had occurred with Demetrios’ aid, first had Nestor beheaded outside the city, and then had Demetrios run stabbed with spears in prison, on October 26, 304 AD. Later Demetrios’ servant Lupus was beheaded after using his master’s blood-stained tunic and signet ring to work many miracles. The Christians buried Demetrios and Nestor together in the bath house where Demetrios had been imprisoned, and today a magnificent basilica-cathedral stands on the very site of his martyrdom. Instead of the foul smell there before, the grace of God shone forth and the body of St. Demetrios was shown to be a source of heavenly-smelling and healing myrrh, even to this day.

St. Demetrios is so dearly loved by the Christians of his city that for hundreds of years in Thessaloniki the Church has celebrated his memory with an entire week of divine services recounting the final days of the martyr’s life. Many of the hymns for this incredible event were written by St. Symeon of Thessaloniki in the 15th century, so we can see how long this tradition has endured. Thus, beginning on October 19 they begin the “Holy Week of St. Demetrios” and proceed to the feast of St. Demetrios on October 26, with a procession of his myrrh-flowing relics carried through the whole city by the military, led by many bishops, hundreds of priests and deacons, and thousands upon thousands of the faithful. The entire city smells like myrrh!

Finally, it was seen as truly providential that the Greek army retook the city of Thessaloniki on October 26, 1912 after almost 400 years of Islamic/Turkish occupation. May we have the holy prayers of this most popular and beloved of Saints that we might boldly confess Christ before the world, look to him for protection from danger, and ask for his help and victory against our true adversary, the devil. (*1 Peter 5:8*)






