Beloved in Christ:

As we gathered in our beloved Church early Monday evening, October 2 – after what was for many of us a sleepless night – there was a profound sense of unity in prayer among the 160 who were present. In 2017 our country has been facing one tragedy after another, with increased

violence and "unnatural" catastrophic disasters, but who would have thought the largest shooting massacre in US history – which left 58 dead and hundreds wounded – would occur just three miles away from our Church? Not only our city, but our parish was directly affected: Teens, young adults and adults were present at the Route 91 Harvest Festival and witnessed the unthinkable; our parish members were among the first responders, doctors, nurses and counselors who tended to the wounded and, sadly, the departed; moreover, many lined up to donate blood for the victims. Even in this darkest period for our city and, yes, country, our Lord Jesus Christ was present through the selfless acts of love and courage offered by so many.

With the holiday season approaching this month, we are given a wonderful opportunity with the *Christmas Fast*, which *begins on November 15*, to revisit our priorities and renew our relationship with Christ and His Holy Orthodox Church – and through this spiritual renewal we will understand that we have so much to be thankful for as we celebrate the Thanksgiving holiday. Renewal and gratitude . . . these may seem an abnormal response when facing tragedy and suffering. Yet in the prophecies of the Old Testament it was in the context of destruction and anguish that the holy prophets reassured the ancient Israelites that God was with them: "For the mountains may depart and the hills be removed, but My steadfast love shall not depart from you, and My covenant of peace shall not be removed, says the Lord, Who has compassion on you." (Isaiah 54:10) However, while speaking hopefully of God's love and

fidelity toward His creation, there was the underlying prophetic call to repentance – that is, the need for God's people to change their minds and hearts and return to Him.

How much more true in our times is the need for each of us – as the members of Christ's Body – to pause prayerfully . . . and reflect on the evil and disorder that abounds . . . to be honest about the ways that we who are made in God's image and likeness participate in evil or behave unnaturally by succumbing to the passions, bad thoughts, unkind words and sinful actions . . . to genuinely be sorry for our sins and bad habits . . . and to repent, confess and ask forgiveness from



God and those whom we have offended. Through the process of repentance we – personally and as a community – can experience in a real and powerful way the love and mercy of Christ our God, Who came in the flesh to redeem us, deliver us and reconcile us with Him and one another in His Kingdom.

Just as so many of us were eager to prayerfully, empathetically and selflessly rise to the occasion a few weeks ago, let us continuously toil to live as "a people of His own who are zealous for good deeds." (Titus 2:14)



Parish Council Report

As I write this month's column, I do so with a heavy heart knowing that our great community recently suffered a terrible, heinous act of terror perpetrated by an individual consumed with nothing more than pure evil. Although many are searching for answers as to why this evil coward rained down a hail of bullets upon people merely out to enjoy themselves with an evening of music and fun, the reasons may never be known, other than just pure vile

evil. Our thoughts and prayers go out to the many victims and their families. For those who were lost, may their memories be eternal. In offering prayers, it is important to remember the first responders who did so much that night and to remember the people who had to process the scene the next day to try and figure out what happened; let us pray to give them all courage and strength. It is also important to remember in prayer those who were there and witnessed firsthand the tragic events unfold, because they are going to carry it with them forever, especially the young people present. Some teens and young adults from our Church Community were there and we hope and pray they fully recover from the upheaval they witnessed and experienced, and know that there is still good in the world. It is also important to remember the many people who gave their time, talents and treasures to help out after this anguishing ordeal. We also offer our sincere gratitude to the International Orthodox Christian Charities (IOCC) for sending us the four wonderful Priests who were part of the crisis team. They were a true blessing for our Church and the Las Vegas Community, and we cannot thank them enough.

We have a *Parish Assembly* scheduled for *Sunday, November 19*, in Panos Hall, shortly after the Liturgy. We strongly urge you all to attend, learn about the operation of our Parish, and provide input into our administration. At the Assembly, we have a very important agenda to discuss and act upon (see Page 3). Primarily, we will be discussing and approving the Parish Budget for Fiscal Year 2018, nominating Parishioners for election to the Parish Council, nominating and electing an internal Audit Committee, and receiving reports on the 2017 Greek Food Festival, the current financial status, Iconography and results of the internal and external audits of the Parish finances. In addition, we are going to be discussing and approving new Parish Bylaws. Our current Bylaws are decades old and are in dire need of being updated. The proposed Parish Bylaws have been reviewed in depth and approved by the Parish Council. They now need to be approved by the Parish Assembly and then submitted to the Metropolis for final approval. It is vital that you look at them prior to the Assembly and have your questions and suggestions ready. The Bylaws were drafted pursuant to the Uniform Parish Regulations, Nevada Law, IRS regulations, and our Parish's norms and customs. Again, please come to the Parish Assembly and actively participate.

We are presently getting ready to start our *2018 Stewardship Drive*, beginning with the *Stewardship All Star Luncheon* scheduled for *Sunday, December 3*, immediately after the Liturgy in Panos Hall. We will honor Sophia Leonis, Kiki Mavrantonis and Ramona Tasios. Please attend and enjoy the great food and fellowship.

It is vitally incumbent on everyone to get behind our Stewardship Program. Stewardship is the method or program St. John Greek Orthodox Parishioners have agreed to use for the operation of the Church. Without the Stewardship Program, we cannot meet our financial obligations, and cannot support the various Church programs and ministries. Stewardship contributions go toward administrative expenses, clergy salaries, employee salaries, utilities, insurance, health insurance, Church ministries, youth ministries, religious education, Archdiocese Commitments, Metropolis Commitments, Clergy Laity Conferences, maintenance, Church supplies, office supplies, and many other items. To become a Steward requires only that you complete a Stewardship Pledge Card each year and fulfill your commitment. The amount of the pledge is an individual decision governed solely by your heart (the Archdiocese recommends optimally but does not mandate ten percent of gross income).

As a Parish, without sugar coating it, we have been sorely lacking in our Stewardship commitments to say the least for decades. We strive year after year to reach very moderate goals with limited success. A lot of hard work has gone into making the Stewardship Program work; however, every year is merely a repeat of the previous year. It is well past time for all Parishioners to take a hard look at what the future holds for our Church. We cannot continue with business as usual regarding Stewardship.

Stewardship should *completely* fund the entire operating account for our Church. Funds we receive from the Greek Food Festival each year are supposed to be used *solely* for capital expenditures, such as paying the mortgage, repairing our buildings or constructing new facilities. Unfortunately, Festival funds get diverted each year to cover shortfalls in the operating account and this severely impacts our ability to expand or even properly maintain our beautiful facilities and grounds. The perpetual shortfall in our Stewardship continually and significantly limits what our Church can do going forward in the way of capital improvements, greater funding for our ministries, maintaining and repairing our facilities and fulfilling our visions for the future, especially with our youth.

Here are some simple hard facts. In our current configuration, it will take approximately \$950,000 in 2018 to operate our Church. Usually we receive around roughly \$400,000 in Stewardship pledges. Our usual receipts will equate to only approximately 42 percent of the Operating Account at most; thus, leaving us woefully short by 58 percent of where we should be in a perfect world. We absolutely have to get Stewardship fully on track where it covers most if not all of our operating expenses. The choice comes down to what type of Church you want and what type of future you want for the Church. To have a Church takes a highly dedicated and intense Community effort. So please look into your heart, pray, and give-back accordingly to help our Church in this coming year. As you ponder the foregoing and your decision on Stewardship, please remember that Stewardship is about vision and making that vision come to fruition.

Pertaining to the Iconography, we are moving on it with all due haste by working on obtaining certification as a 501(c)(3) organization. We have submitted virtually all the necessary paperwork. The only thing now lacking is an approved 2018 budget. As previously stated, we hired a lawyer who specializes in forming 501(c)(3) charitable organizations to get us this designation. Once this is done, we will again work on getting the Iconographers here to Las Vegas in the very near future.

In closing, we want to again thank the various Church ministries and organizations, and the many individuals for all the work they do and have done for our Church. May God Bless.



From Father Seraphim

This month on *November 21* we celebrate one of the Twelve Major Feasts of our Church, *the Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple*. The young Virgin was brought by her parents to dwell in the Holy of Holies, where the glory of the Lord dwelled. It is as if we were to allow a young girl to live in the Holy Altar. In fact, it may seem even more curious, because only the High Priest could go into the Holy of Holies and even then just once a year: A rope was tied around his ankle, so that if he died – overcome by the awe and power of God – he could be dragged out without another needing to enter in after him. This event that we gather to celebrate is really very strange! The three-year old Mary enters and lives where angels of the Lord ascend and descend. So then, what is the importance of this unique event for her, for the Church, and for us?



St. Gregory Palamas answers this question saying that this feast exemplifies the fruit of a life of prayer and stillness. Some believed that humanity was not able to have true contact with God; St. Gregory argued that with preparation this was indeed possible – even for our youngest children! He tells us that the Virgin is the example of this, *par excellence*: "While the holy Maid dwelled in the innermost sanctuary, she made high ascents in her heart, which reached as far as the heavens themselves, and drew the heavenly Lord from there to us." Through these ascents she herself became the true Holy of Holies. Her whole life became a preparation for receiving the Lord. The significance of this feast is that we recognize human cooperation with divine grace and the accomplishment of our salvation. Indeed, all of us are called to co-work with God and to prepare for His coming into our lives, especially through Holy Communion.

We must try, as we are able, to prepare for such a glorious happening. We have no rope tied around our ankle if we approach unworthily. Holy Communion requires preparation and it "burns the unworthy" as we say in our prayers at every Liturgy. The Theotokos prepared herself through a life lived in secret within the Holy of Holies. In stillness, prayer, fasting, and reading of the Divine Scriptures she was made ready. Through her entrance into the Temple she gave entrance to the Lord into her womb, into this world and into our hearts. In our preparation for receiving Holy Communion we are likewise called to *lift up our gates that the King of Glory may enter. (Psalm 24:9)*

Today, the glory of the Lord does not dwell in the Temple of Solomon, as it has been destroyed; nor is He found in the womb of the Virgin, for Christ has been born. The glory of the Lord dwells humbly within the human heart. The heart has become the seat of the King and, as St. Gregory says, it has become the "Throne of Grace." In receiving Communion the King is enthroned and granted dominion over our hearts. Ultimately during this Feast we celebrate the mercy and love of God toward humanity and its preparation to receive the gift of Christ and, with Him, abundant life. We are called to prepare, as we are able, through means such as prayer, fasting and reading, to receive the Lord; to cultivate a humble disposition of heart since it was the humility of the Virgin (even at such a young age) that allowed her to enter the Temple, and God to enter her womb.

Finally, and perhaps most importantly, from this sacred Feast we see the profound measure in which God communes with all ages. As we prepare ourselves for our most important encounter each week in Holy Communion, let us not exclude our children from the preparation for the banquet feast of God's Kingdom as well. If Christ Himself was brought by the Virgin Mary into the temple at just forty days old (the basis of our service of Churching the Child before Baptism), and if the Panagia entered the Temple to live in purity from just three years of age – how much more should we, in imitation of her holy parents Joachim and Anna, bring our children into the Church even from their infancy! It is not knowledge, status or gray hair that Christ requires in order for Him to come, live within a person, and fill them with His abiding presence: Christ, the King of Glory, resides in the heart that is humble, transforming it into His throne of grace.


